

# PARISH POST

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

On a recent classroom visit, one of our students asked me, "Why do we crown Mary?" Great question! Why do we do that? Is it because Mary is a goddess and we worship Mary? No. The Blessed Trinity is God and worship God alone! Instead, we crown Mary because she is the queen of heaven and earth. And why is that? Well, the Bible clearly teaches us that Jesus is the king (gospel genealogies go to great lengths to show that Jesus is of the royal line of King David) and since Jesus is the king, Mary is the queen! That's because at the time of Jesus, the royal queen was not the wife of the royal king, but the *mother* of the king. So Mary's queenship reminds us of something very important about Jesus: that he is *the* King. He is the King of the universe and should also be the King of our hearts.

Now back to the question. For centuries Christians have shown their gratitude and honor to Mary by having special crowning ceremonies. We don't crown Mary because we worship her, but to show her honor and respect because of her total commitment to God and love of Jesus, her Son.

More recently, these crownings happen in the month of May because this is a month every year dedicated to Mary. Traditionally, the Catholic Church has dedicated special days of the week and months of the year to certain devotions. For example, Saturday is a weekday dedicated to Mary and the month of May is dedicated to Mary. Therefore it is fitting to crown Mary in the special month in which we try to show her more love and devotion. After all, she is our queen mother too!

Friends, just as Jesus came to the world through Mary, we are to go to him through Mary, as well. In this way, Mary is the conduit for divine encounter with Jesus! As we approach our parish feast day on May 31st, the feast of the Visitation, let's take advantage of opportunities to go to Mary: the rosary, prayerful conversations, the angelus, or a good Marian book. Seeking Christ in One Another The funeral luncheon, the Irish wake, the vigil at an ailing loved one's bedside: in times of crisis, people gather. In moments of sadness, fear, and confusion, we gravitate toward one another. For some reason, the feelings are so much more bearable when we are not alone. I'm sure that the disciples and their companions, gathered in the upper room after the Lord's Ascension, did all of the things we typically do at these functions. I'm sure they hugged and talked and shared food, processing together the remarkable events they had witnessed. But we don't hear about any of that. We hear only that they prayed — fervently, and together. Saint John Paul II famously said that "it is Jesus that you seek when you dream of happiness; He is waiting for you when nothing else you find satisfies you." And I think that, whenever we gather, in good times or in bad, we think we are seeking companionship — but we are actually seeking God. As I think back on the last few crisis-gatherings my family has had, I try to remember when we have stopped everything to pray together. I can think of a few times, but to be honest, they are too few. We are usually occupied with more practical tasks: planning the funeral, talking to the doctor, making the decisions, ordering the food. Just trying to survive through it. But this is the busywork of sorrow, and it is a waste of our time. We would do better to follow the example of the disciples and remember that, in these dire moments, God is waiting for us. "Of you my heart speaks; you my glance seeks." — Psalm 27

Residence restriction laws are state and local laws that prevent convicted sexual offenders from living within a specific range of a school, park, daycare, bus stop, or other known area for children. Many states have adopted some form of residence restriction to prevent sexual offenders from committing repeat crimes. These laws exist and have an impact, but they are only one layer of protection and are not a guarantee that a park, bus stop or other space is safe.
